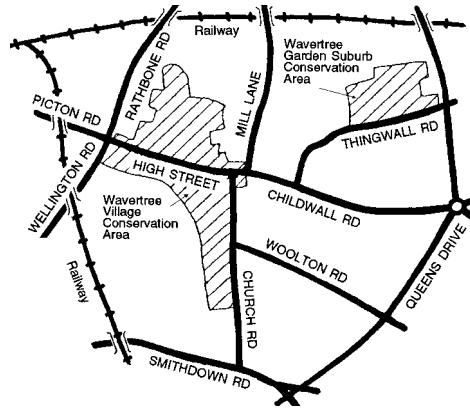

## OUR ACHIEVEMENTS 1977-2009

... include the designation of Wavertree Village as a CONSERVATION AREA, the rescue of the TOWN HALL from dereliction, the conversion of an eyesore site in the High Street into a ROSE GARDEN, the display of CONSERVATION AREA PLATES at the approaches to Wavertree Village and Wavertree Garden Suburb, the saving of the old ROSE BREWERY building from demolition and ROSE COTTAGE from disfigurement, the refurbishment of the Mill Lane SWING PARK, the fitting of a new mechanism to the PICTON CLOCK, the tightening-up of Conservation Controls within Wavertree GARDEN SUBURB, the saving of SANDOWN PLAYING FIELDS from development, the modification of SHOPFRONT DESIGNS in the High Street, the imposition of TREE PRESERVATION ORDERS on the Cenacle Convent and Olive Mount Hospital sites, the NAMING OF STREETS after historical sites and personalities, the retention of the historic LAMB inn name, the restoration of the former SMALLEST HOUSE façade, the creation of a LINEAR PARK, complete with SUPERLAMBANANA, within the Olive Mount Redevelopment, the removal of inappropriate STREET FURNITURE and redundant SIGNAGE from Wavertree High Street, the promotion of Wavertree's uniquely interesting HERITAGE AND LEGENDS in local newspapers, radio and on TV, the issuing of a new ADVISORY LEAFLET for the Wavertree Village Conservation Area, regular participation in HERITAGE OPEN DAYS (opening the Lock-up to the public every September), and the publication of our books DISCOVERING HISTORIC WAVERTREE and 'WAVERTREE' (Images of England).

## IN FUTURE, WITH YOUR SUPPORT

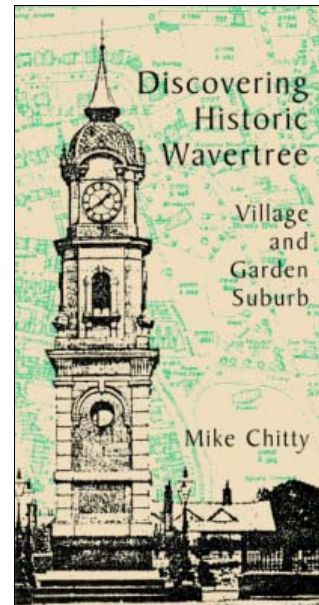
... the Society will continue to CAMPAIGN for improvement in local amenities and the environment, ENCOURAGE property-owners to conserve the area's historic buildings, CHECK the register of planning applications (making representations to the City Council where appropriate), WATCH for other changes which may have an adverse effect on the local environment, SEEK new owners or uses for empty and decaying buildings and sites, PUBLICISE the City Council's Conservation policies, ORGANISE meetings, talks and visits, etc., for members, COMMUNICATE with Society members and others by means of Newsletters and our Website, PUBLISH booklets on local history, etc., INSTALL PLAQUES on historic buildings, HELP schools and students with their projects, SPEAK OUT on behalf of Conservation in Wavertree, and FOSTER a new sense of community and pride in the area.

Illustrated with a mixture of line drawings, photographs and maps, *Discovering Historic Wavertree* takes you on a guided five mile walk - either 'for real' or in the comfort of your armchair - around Wavertree's two Conservation Areas: the Village and the Garden Suburb. It is full of fascinating facts and stories about Wavertree past and present. The Society's website - at [www.wavertreesociety.org](http://www.wavertreesociety.org) - was established in 1999 and has been maintained ever since as a record of our activities. It also contains an extensive gallery of images of Wavertree, past and present, and information about local history.

There is a special section devoted to the history and features of the **Wavertree Garden Suburb**, which is 100 years old next year: the foundation stone of the first house - now No.13 Wavertree Nook Road - having been laid on 20th July 1910. Other sections cover, in detail, our (successful) campaign to keep the Blue Coat School in Wavertree, and our campaigns regarding Sandown Hall and Olive Mount.

There is also a **Wavertree Memories** section in which the reminiscences of former residents are recorded for posterity, and this links to a **Message Board** where people can post queries about their family history, etc.
